A House of Prayer

Today we recall the Basilica Saint John of Lateran, the Pope's own church, the Cathedral of Rome. The Lateran was chosen as the Cathedral Rome long before Saint Peter's was built. It is where the papacy was housed for centuries before moving across the Tiber to where Vatican City now stands. The gospel about the purification of the temple of Jerusalem is apt for today's feast. The Jerusalem temple serves as a symbol of the Church of today, in the twenty-first century. It conveys both the idea of the temple's sacredness, and also the need for constant purification of the structures of our Church.

"In the temple he found those who were selling oxen and sheep and pigeons, and the money-changers at their business." Today it is not in our churches that trade, business, and commerce of all kind are conducted; but they take place outside, including on Sundays. Our concentration on material things often makes us forget to go to church. On Sundays, instead of the believers gathering in the church, we see them elsewhere, going about their business. "Zeal for your house will consume me." Can we let ourselves be consumed, like Christ, with enthusiasm for worshiping God? May desire to fill the house of God fill our hearts! May this church where we are gathered be the place of prayer, and not one of trade! May the universal Church which unites all believers be a community of humble worship, led by pastors deeply imbued with the spirit of Christ.

The Lateran Basilica

The first Christian emperor, Constantine, had a church built on land that once belonged to the Laterani family. That 4th century church was the precursor of the present Basilica. The Baptistry attached to the present Basilica is where emperor Constantine was baptized. This Basilica now serves as the Cathedral of the Diocese of Rome. It is the Pope's own church in his capacity as Bishop of Rome. For that reason, it has the title, "mother and head of all the churches of the city and the world," and that includes our own parish church where we are gathered for prayer. While

It is the Catholic cathedral of the Diocese of Rome in the city of Rome, Italy. It serves as the seat of the bishop of Rome, the pope. The only "archbasilica" in the world, it lies outside of Vatican City proper.

our church is much smaller than the Basilica of Saint John Lateran in Rome, both are equally monuments to people's faith. In the first reading Paul tells the Christians in Corinth, "you are God's building you are God's temple." More fundamental than the building we call church are the people we call church. The building we call church is there to help us to express our identity as a people of faith called to worship God through Christ in the Spirit. If our worship is to be authentic, the shape of our worship must become the shape of our lives. Our whole lives are to be a movement towards God, through Christ and in the Spirit. This is what it means to be church, to be the temple of God in the world. This is the heart of our baptismal calling.

Re-mem-bering: Making Sense of the Past for the Present

What does it mean to remember? Perhaps it is better described as 're-mem-bering': the act of assembling separated fragments or "bits" to create a complete whole. This whole must be meaningful and relevant to us *here and now*.

The World Wars, given their immense scale, offer millions of fragments for us to "re-member". By putting these pieces together, we gain profound affirmations:

- Evil must never be allowed to triumph in the affairs of nations.
- We must hold fast to the truth that no people or races are superior to others.
- Fighting for these values demands an immensely costly toll in terms of human life.

Remembrance Day thus serves a dual purpose: it is a day of thanksgiving for those who suffered and died in this cause, and a renewal of our personal resolve to overcome evil in the world. If we abandon remembering, we risk forgetting these basic values and ignoring the crucial need to learn from the errors of history. This lesson is desperately needed in the current global situation.

The ultimate goal of remembering is to be better fitted for living in the present, which informs our understanding of issues like the current military presence around the globe.

Christian Re-mem-bering

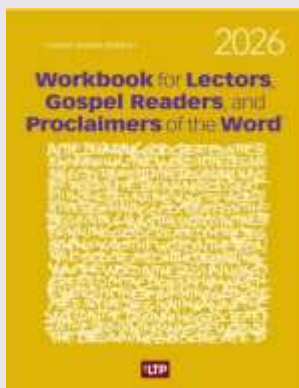
The Christian faith is fundamentally about "re-mem-bering"—putting the pieces together. This process has continued for 2000 years.

- The first Christians had the advantage of personal memories, like surviving war veterans, regarding the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus.
- Over time, this remembering continues, evolving as new insights and experiences are added, led by the Holy Spirit.
- Christian re-mem-bering helps us build on the historic faith to live lives today, informed and directed by the presence of God and the power of the Holy Spirit. Stopping this process means "losing the plot".
- We revisit Scriptures and Christian festivals (like Easter and Pentecost) yearly for this reason, bringing new experience to each remembrance.

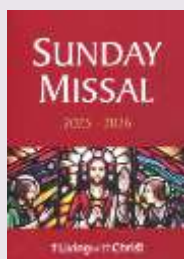
